## **A MESSAGE FROM THE ELDERS**

It has been said many times that our future lies in front of us so we should move forward without looking back. Luke 9:62 Jesus says "**No one, having put his hand to the plow, and looking back, is fit for the kingdom of God.**" (NKJV) Is Christ teaching that we are to never look in the past? No. Christ's lesson is that once we decide to obey Him and then put that decision into action by way of baptism, we are not to look back at our old selves and risk turning back to our old ways of living in the world. We look forward at the task at hand which is to be "Christ Like" no matter what adversities, temptations, or even failures we experience, we are to forge ahead in living as Christ. This may mean asking him for strength

to overcome and it may mean asking for forgiveness when we fall, looking ahead is having a dependence on Him whatever the circumstance as long as we know God will be our judge and we live our lives righteously.

Contrary to the thought of forward looking, at times, looking back is essential. Consider how many times Moses is referred to in the New Testament.
