And as we come to grips with all that...we further learn that we have a purpose. Do you see what it is?

"That you (you and me) may proclaim the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light". Isn't that something? David and Peter are focused on evangelism! Why? Because, like us, they both knew what it was like being lost and then being redeemed. They wanted to tell others about the joy of their salvation.

To "proclaim the praises of Him" is our goal. Why? Because He is our Savior, the joy of our salvation.

"We Are Afflicted"

Paul stated in II Cor. 4:7-10 – "But we have treasure in earthen vessels, so that the surpassing greatness of the power will be of God and not from ourselves; afflicted in every way but not crushed, perplexed, but not departing, persecuted but not forsaken, struck down, but not destroyed, always carrying about in the body the dying of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus also may be manifested in our body."

Just recently three congregations here in the Indianapolis area have been afflicted by controversy that has led to division. Not knowing all the details of the particulars of these divisions it is not mine to address these and make a judgment to what or who is right or wrong, etc.

However, it is an observation that Satan is busy. He is doing just what he wants to do and that is to cause confusion and division.

As a result "affliction" has been put upon many. While

this is so sad, Paul is stating an affliction that occurs when the god of the world tries to cover the light of the gospel of Jesus Christ. He is stating that those who uphold and teach the gospel can be afflicted even to the point of death for Christ.

Now the test for us – the "modern day Christian" is before us. Are we afflicted? Have we given up because of Satan's tactics? Have we been crushed? Have we been struck down? Certainly Paul said that they had been.

Paul states in verse 14 of that same passage "..knowing that He who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and will present us with you." What a comforting thought – we can be raised by the same One who raised Christ.

Philippians 4:13 states "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." Do we believe this? Do we believe that when we are struck down or crushed or afflicted? Paul certainly did.

Yes, we can be afflicted – yet we can overcome all things through Christ.

All of us here at Greenwood need to crumble to our knees and pray to God that we never let Satan afflict us in such a way that a division occurs within us.
