<u>"Huh?"</u> By Steve Niemeier

Several years ago Connie and I were fortunate to be able to take my mother and father to the lectures in Tampa, Florida. We drove them down and as we talked in the car it seemed that the most common word we heard was "huh".

As we know traveling in a car can be noisy enough with the outside traffic, etc. This of course creates a constant sound and it becomes hard to hear one who might be speaking in the front seat if you are in the back seat. Also, as we get older it does become a bit harder to hear in just normal conditions. We constantly joked about how many times the word "huh" was used on that trip.

There are times as I talk with brethren that I stop and say to myself "huh"? It seems we can come up with justification of about anything if we have friends or family involved in something that the Bible does not condone. HUH?

Many excuses are made for one forsaking worship services or shunning their other responsibilities as a member or their marriage situation. HUH? Several years ago the subject of baptism washing away the sin of adultery was a very prevalent subject. Several took the position (and some still do) that if one was living in an adulterous marriage relationship and was baptized then all was forgiven and they could go on living in the adulterous relationship.

As I traveled around to gospel meetings and was asked to speak on this subject I usually started the lesson explaining the position and then would say "huh"?

It seemed everyone wanted to jump to baptism and forgot about another very important step - repentance. Jesus said any who did not repent would perish. Repentance is a complete turning away from the sin that one is involved in. Sometimes a person may not realize something is a sin until after baptism – yet repentance is required and a complete turning away from that sin is instrumental in repentance. Therefore upon learning they are in an adulterous relationship repentance must occur in order to be in accordance with God.

This principle applies in all areas – lying, stealing, murder, etc. Yet we continue to have brethren try to defend the different situations their family or friends have become involved in. It is sad but many preachers, elders and congregations have taken the stand

of justification rather than the stand of searching the scriptures. HUH?

It is easier sometimes to try and justify a situation than it is to face the call of repentance and flee a situation. HUH?

John 8:32 certainly applies to this issue!
