Jesus Declared to be the Lamb of God

John 1:35-42

What we read in v. 36 is the declaration of an inspired, unbiased prophet. He refers to Jesus as "The Lamb of God." Earlier John made the same declaration and added "who takes away the sins of the world." Remember that this statement was made to a Jewish audience that would have received it in the context of their background and religion.

To help understand the effect that the sacrifice of the lamb might have upon a devout Jew and his attitude toward sin, let's go through the steps of the sin offering in detail using Leviticus 4:32-35 as a guide.

After the selection and approval of the lamb, you would carry the animal by yourself to the altar. Imagine bringing a quivering little lamb in your arms to the altar, knowing what violence must come to it. All the while you are reminded that this is necessary because of your sins. Then after laying the animal on the altar, you lay your hands on the innocent, quivering lamb. This indicates the transmission and delegation and implied representation; so that it really points to the substitution of the sacrifice for you. While doing so the following prayer was repeated, "I entreat O Jehovah, I have sinned, I have done perversely, I have rebelled, I have committed sin; but I return in repentance, and let this be for my

atonement." (Edersheim, The Temple, page 114)

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Unlike some animals, when a lamb realizes that death is near they do not cry out. Instead, large ears well up in their eyes and they cry silently. So there you are, looking into the tearful eyes of the lamb that is dying for you as you thrust your hands forcibly upon it. You might be tempted to stop, but remember that this is necessary because of your sins.

Then the lamb is killed. Leviticus 4:33 implies that you should kill the lamb yourself. However, by the first century it was customary for the priest to take the knife and cut the throat of the sacrificial lamb. Edersheim gives the following description of this process: "One priest drew forward the windpipe and gullet of the sacrifice, and quickly thrust upwards the knife, while another caught the blood in a golden bowl." (Temple, p. 162) As you see the knife thrust in and up and the lamb jerk as it dies, you are forced to remember that this is necessary because of my sin. Leviticus 4:34 states, "The priest shall take some of the blood of the sin offering with his finger, put it on the horns of the altar of burnt offering, and pour its remaining blood at the base of the altar. The base of the altar must have been a rancid, fly-covered blood drain. As you grimace from the smell you are again forced to remember, this is necessary because of my sin.

Jesus is that innocent, pure Lamb that is destined to go to His death without protest because of my sin. If the entire process of killing a sacrificial lamb does not put a lump in your throat, imagine picking up the knife and thrusting it up and into the windpipe of God's only Son.

My dear friend, sin is serious, ugly, and repulsive.

"Behold the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world." With these 13 words, John captures the heart and soul of the gospel. This declaration should be at the center of our evangelism and continuing message.

I cannot think of Jesus as the Lamb of God without thinking of the words written by Isaac Watts; "Alas and did my Savior bleed and did my Sovereign die? Would He devote that sacred head for such a worm as I?"
