The story is told of a college professor (psychology) whose final exam had only one question. The one question was "Why?" This, of course, produced more than a little consternation in the students depending upon the outcome of the test to raise their grade for the course. Unlike Paul Harvey, I am not going to tell you the rest of the story.

Why? Why do you assemble with the saints? It is easy for one to respond, "To worship God." Yes, such is easy to say, but is that answer accurate? One good way to know why an individual assembles with the saints on Lord's day morning/evening is to consider what it takes to prevent him from assembling and/or cause her to complain about the worship service/sermon. One oft repeated excuse (i.e., a lie masquerading as a reason) and/or complaint is "I didn't get

anything out of the service," or "I wasn't getting anything out of the sermons." In years gone bye preachers were known to respond to such by asking, "Did you bring anything to put it in?" Empty pews are bad, and empty heads in the pews are not good either. The empty heads of which I speak are not the ones which are empty intellectually, but those which are empty spiritually.

In true worship God is the center of focus. When one says, "I didn't get anything out of it," s/he is in essence saying "Move over. God: I'm the one who is really important." Since God wants us to assemble with the saints (Hebrews 10:25) we will, if He is truly the focus of our life, be present. . .even if it seems at times that we did not get anything out of the service, or the sermon was a bit dry. The greater the spiritual maturity the more s/he will get out of the worship service. As one grows in spiritual knowledge and understanding the larger the container one has to "put it in." I heard of an elderly gentleman, a totally deaf brother-in-Christ, who understood that in worship he was not the focal point. Once he was asked why he attended the worship services when he

could not hear the songs sung, the prayers offered nor the sermons preached. His response, a classic, was "I go to encourage our young preacher." As a preacher who once was young, I can assure you that young preachers, and us old ones too, are encouraged by your attendance.

Now tell me once again, why is it that you do not assemble with the saints?
