In fact, His death is to be done in remembrance of Him and certainly any one that has studied God's word knows that there was nothing pertaining to "commercialism" about Jesus.

Outlandish parties will occur during this time of year both in the workplace and at home that many avoid during the rest of the year. Many will partake of alcoholic beverages this time of year that avoid them at other times of the year.
